Commingled Recyclables, consisting of recyclable, aluminum, tin, plastics and papers:

### **Materials Accepted:**

- Aluminum food and beverage containers
- Ferrous (Iron) cans
- PET plastic containers with the symbol #1 – narrow neck containers only
- HDPE natural plastic containers with the symbol #2 – narrow neck containers only (milk and water bottles)
- HDPE pigmented plastic containers with the symbol #2 – narrow neck containers only (detergent, shampoo, bleach bottles, etc. without caps)
- Empty 5 gallon pails
- Newsprint
- Old corrugated cardboard
- Magazines
- Catalogs
- Printer paper
- Copier paper
- Mail

### **Materials Not Accepted:**

- Lead acid batteries
- Dry cell batteries
- Glass food and beverage containers
- Plastics with symbols #3, #4, #5, #6, #7
- Empty paint cans
- Empty Oil or antifreeze containers
- Microwave trays
- Mirrors
- Window or auto glass
- Light Bulbs
- Ceramics
- Porcelain
- Plastics unnumbered
- Plastic bags
- Coat hangers
- Glass cookware/bakeware
- Household items such as cooking pots, toasters, etc.
- Cereal boxes
- Tube and core stock
- Telephone books

All tin cans, bi-metal cans, and aluminum cans must be empty and contain less than 5% food debris.

All aerosol cans must be empty with less than 5% content

All plastic containers must be empty, caps removed; less than 5% food debris.

All Fiber must be dry and free of food debris and other contaminating material.

Tissues, paper towels or other paper that has been in contact with food is not acceptable.

**In addition to the standards set forth above,  
Recyclables must be of such a quality and nature as not to:**

- Create flammable or explosive conditions in BuRRT's facilities, no dry cell batteries or lead acid batteries accepted.
- Contain chemical or other properties which are deleterious or capable of causing material damage.
- Include any hazardous or toxic substance as defined by applicable Federal or State regulations, or any medical waste, including syringes.
